

Tips and advice from you! Since the last Newsletter I haven't received many pieces of advice about what makes life easier when making items for KfN. I know that many of you are experts and surely must have some words of wisdom! Please send in any helpful hints for the next Newsletter – they are invaluable. Perhaps you know some good places to order zips/safety eyes/buttons/fabrics? Maybe you have a tip about what yarns suit certain of our items best? Do you have particular ways of making items? Many makers aren't on Facebook, so they don't get to see the tips on our group there. See page 13 for this month's tips.



#### Animals' and monsters' eyes

If you look at your own eye (in a mirror!) you see a white and inside that a colour and inside that a black pupil and sometimes inside that a white highlight. So if you're making eyes on your item please try to include all those. If not possible please always ensure that you include the black pupil because without it the item can look a bit too scary! And therapists say that the children relate very well to faces that look a bit "human". We encourage the use of safety eyes instead if you wish, as they can give the item a lot of character too. And here are lots of pictures for inspiration! Notice the variety of eyebrows you could use.

Notice how the angle of the eyebrows affects the mood. For angry – please keep the eyebrows low, just touching the eye whites.

#### Hand puppets' eyes

On hand puppets you can either use felt for the eyes, or embroider them, or small buttons securely sewn on with white thread (to represent the highlight). Please don't use safety eyes on hand puppets because the backs can be sharp. But safety eyes on stuffed monsters are fine.

#### Sad eyebrows

It's worth noting that the way you slope your monster's or puppet's eyebrows affects the emotion. For our happy/sad sided sets please make the eyebrows slope as in the pictures below. If, as some knitters do, you slope the eyebrows the other way it makes the face look angrier. This can sometimes be useful for therapists but in general please make the face sad.

### THE KNITTED OCTOPUS - is now on the website

We have had very enthusiastic feedback from therapists about the crocheted octopus design by Rachel, and in order to receive more of those we decided to introduce a knitted version.

Many thanks go to Terri in Hull and Dawn in Wiltshire for their kind collaboration with Val on this pattern, and to Rachel for the original crochet design. The new pattern is now on the website.

Also available on request is Terri Cook's octopus pattern for the experienced knitter who prefers to minimise sewing up. Terri's octopus is knitted top down in the round on either circular or double pointed needles. Techniques used include provisional cast on, making bobbles, short rows and Kitchener stitch. Like our crocheted octopus, Terri's is decorated with small knitted sea creatures. Please contact Clare if you'd like that pattern – it's for advanced knitters.



**TOOTHY has been edited again.** We realised that many of the Toothy monsters recently were coming out a bit on the small side and a bit too thin, so once again we have produced a more up-to-date version. ### IF YOU CROCHET AND WOULD LIKE TO MAKE SOME HAND PUPPETS WE HAVE A NEW PATTERN WITH STUFFED HEADS COMING SOON!

It's by our very talented crochet pattern maker, Rachel, who also made the patterns for many of our worry eaters. We are always short of hand puppets so please give these a try!

We are so fortunate at KfN to have some extremely talented and hard working pattern makers who give their time and expertise freely for the charity and they deserve our heartfelt thanks.

It's not immediately obvious that there are numerous considerations that the pattern makers have to take into account apart from the initial design - it's quite an art:

- The overall size of the item, depending on whether we are aiming it at group therapy or individual work. For hand puppets, will the puppet fit an adult therapist's hand? Even a larger hand eg. a male?
- Which yarns work best, allowing for no gaps between the stitches on stuffed items
- The best size of needles/hooks
- How easy/difficult it will be for the average knitter. Not everyone is experienced, so we need patterns that can be tackled by most knitters quite easily
- Technical details have to be right eg. for our items the pocket for the worry papers must be nice and deep
- Safety details need to be included in our patterns as our items are used with children
- The pattern needs to be clearly set out, with pictures which directly relate to the text (it's no good recommending something in the text and having a picture next to that text which doesn't depict that recommendation!)
- The order of assembling the item needs to be logical and explained clearly

When we first started quite honestly we didn't have a clue about how best to go about making items that would be useful to the therapists – our initial worry eaters were basically just stuffed tubes with a shallow pocket, (no ears, horns, legs, arms, noses, features etc.). We have learnt such a lot over the years, especially about making the items far more child-friendly and exciting/interesting. Such a lot of features are important in therapy – the facial expression, the cuddleability (!) on large items, the interesting characteristics and additions that make for a starting point in a conversation etc. All these things can be the catalysts for a real breakthrough with children unable/unwilling to engage with the therapist.

So it's not surprising that, as none of us are professional pattern makers, occasionally patterns need to be edited. We are always grateful to anyone who points out an anomaly in any pattern because it's possible to proof read and test knit patterns several times and still to miss things!

So please bear with us as we do intend to edit out any mistakes and make improvements in our patterns, and we hope that you will wait patiently for things to be amended!

#### No more holes in corners

If you get a hole where you join newly cast on stitches to an existing piece of knitting, you can easily fix it with one extra stitch. This happens on puppets where you add extra stitches for the arm, or at the corners of monsters' mouths. You will see a distinct gap in the row of stitches on your needle next to where the new stitches and the old join. Cast on one more stitch than the pattern requires, then when you come to the gap, knit the two stitches either side of the gap together. Hole closed.

#### Slip and twist

Do you find that when you return stitches you've had on a stitch holder to your needles ready to knit that you've managed to twist them? Always follow the same process to avoid the twist. Always slip your stitches on to the stitch holder purl wise. Always slip them back on to the needle through the back leg of the stitch, that is, knitwise.



Anne in Lancashire – to avoid leaving pins in:

I have a small rectangle of felt on which I keep 4 glass headed pins, 2 green and 2 yellow. I use these to secure the interfacing while I do the faces on the puppets. When I am finished I know that I should have these 4 pins. (Of course you can use the idea for more than 4).

Cathy in Kent – getting the features straight and even:

To make the rabbit worry eater's face easier I bought a 6" polystyrene ball from eBay and I can put the head on it and pin muzzles, ears and noses into position. Makes life a little easier.

Liz in Gloucestershire – a yarn recommendation

A good face coloured yarn is Stylecraft Special DK "Toy", shade 1844

#### Our Mojo makers came up with an alternative way of assembling the Mojo pieces.



We suggest a new 90 or denim needle for this work. Once all pieces cut out, faces stitched and limbs lightly stuffed complete the following sections

Face assembly and layout. Take angry, worried, shock/frightened face pieces and matchingcoloured backs. With right sides together machine sides and bottom seams leaving top open. Side seam 1.5cm. Bottom seam 1 cm. Trim seam allowance, turn and press. Layer faces from the bottom up, shock/frightened, worried, angry. Tack and machine together along the top 1cm seam



Body Assembly Find Happy and Sad faces, (yellow), lining and front pocket pieces



Right sides together, machine bottom of face to pocket lining, 1.5cm seam allowance. Turn and machine a small double hem at the top of the front body piece. (You can use a decorative stitch for this if you like). Place this piece on top of pocket lining slightly above the seam. See picture. Machine sides and base together 1cm seam allowance

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Machine pocket strengthening as shown

Place arms, facing in, on Happy side of the body. Tack and machine in place 1cm in from edge

Make body tube Place sad piece face down onto happy piece, right sides together. Tack and machine side seams 1.5cm allowance. Leave top and bottom open.



Face insertion: Take the 3-face bundle and insert, angry face down onto happy face. Level the tops, tack and machine twice. This is a very thick bundle; a walking foot may make it easier. Trim some of the seam allowances and turn tube through. Press lightly. If not already trimmed, trim base fabric level. The pocket linings may be longer than the body. Turn up a 2 cm hem and place legs pointing down into place. See picture





Machine all around this hem, including over the legs

**Ready to stuff** 

Stuff firmly making sure to get right up to the top corners. When very well stuffed, machine or hand stitch the bottom seam closed. If hand stitching this will need to pass a pull and stretch test to make sure the thread doesn't break under stress. Ideally use a polyester thread for this as it is stronger than cotton.

"We have such a desperate need for the unique items your knitters make. We are hoping your items can be shared with our fairly new team of play therapists, who are offering crucial therapeutic support to children who have experienced the most severe cases of complex developmental trauma and experiences of physical and sexual abuse and neglect. Your items would form a key part of their therapeutic toolkit.

We are really appreciative of anything your fabulous charity can offer when we reach the top of the list, however the items that we would have the greatest need for, if you're able to offer these are...

- animal worry eaters

- pairs of identical hand puppets
- sets of professionals hand puppets
- sets of family members hand puppets

- \*worry monsters with injuries & removal pants" NB from Clare:\*please make these to the large Zippy pattern, not the normal small abuse monster pattern. Please add pants and bruises.

There are 13 therapists in this team and because they are tackling such serious issues we would like to send each one of them each of the above items. # LATEST FEEDBACK FROM RECIPIENTS OF KFN ITEMS



We donated items to "Nessie", a counselling service for children and young people based in Hertfordshire

As you can imagine Knit-for-Nowt receives many quite distressing requests for our items, as resources to help children are either too expensive or not available at all. Many of our items are unique and cannot be found anywhere else, hence the deluge of requests whenever the waiting list opens.

Here's a typical message:

Message: I work as a teacher in a special school. With young children who are bereaved through challenging circumstances, murder and suicide. Children who come from broken homes and are in foster care as parents are drug abusers, and children who have been sexually traumatised. I am always being asked by them for something to hug, a teddy, a blanket. Your support and items would be really appreciated.

I am our school ELSA and frequently support children to understand how they are feeling and help them to work through their emotions. The knitted monsters and puppets have become a really valuable resource to me and our children really love using them. I thought it might be nice for you to hear how some of them have been used so far.



One child was finding it very difficult to work through her emotions in the first person and the worry monsters helped her to put her feelings into the third person. She used the puppets to describe scenarios and how each of them was feeling and what she could give them to help them to re-regulate.

Another child has used the hand puppets to work through some scenarios that he is currently processing as a way of acting out what is happening. I have also found the hand puppets very useful for explaining a change to a younger child in a more visual, interactive way.

Some children just find comfort in one of the creatures sitting with them, drawing or reflecting on uncomfortable feelings.

We also have a child who became obsessed with looking at other children's underwear so the removable pants became the perfect tool to talk, and to use when talking to the whole class.

The work you all do is hugely valued by myself and all the children at our school. Many have hugely benefitted, and we are incredibly grateful for your generosity

# WHAT YOU CAN DO TO HELP

#### We'd like to ask if you'd PLEASE DO THE FOLLOWING SAFETY CHECKS ON YOUR ITEMS

You all make the most incredible items and for the vast majority of the time they are super safe, thank you for the checks you already make on them. This checklist might help to reassure you that you've checked over all aspects of your item, as it's so easy to forget one or two of them! We've all done it! All items are safety checked again before being sent out.

- 1 Have I used an approved stuffing? Check the recommended stuffings document you were sent, or if you haven't received that then please contact Clare
- 2 Have I left any pins in? It's best to use the larger headed pins but even these can become lost in the knitting
- 3 Are all the attachments nice and firm? Pull strongly on all attachments, including any buttons really pull! They must be absolutely secure and unable to be pulled out by a small child. Secure again anything you're not happy with



- 1 Is the hair secure? Between first finger and thumb pull on each and every strand of yarn attached to ensure that none can be pulled out by a small child
- 2 Have I left any holes in my work? Check your item for holes in the stitching where stuffing could be seen through. In particular this can happen at the top of the head on a monster/animal, or at the sides of the mouth pocket/mouth and where you increased the stitches. If you find any holes please sew them up!
- 3 Is anything too long? Check that any choking hazards such as ropes, strands, ribbons, yarn, or lengths of arms/legs are no longer than a maximum of 9" (not counting feet or hands)
- 4 Ooh, what's that pong??! Has my darling pet been lying on my work?? Have a good sniff! Ensure there are no strong odours which might affect asthma/allergy these can include cooking smells, smoke, pets or even strong disinfectant. If the odour is strong please don't use washing powder/fabric freshener but instead rinse in fresh water and/or hang out on the line. And please check for dog/cat hairs on your work

#### WHAT STUFFING SHOULD I USE?

Makers quite rightly are concerned to use the correct, approved stuffing in their monsters and/or puppets' heads, but it's often difficult to tell online whether stuffings are really suitable. The old CE label has become the UKCA label after our leaving the EU, and there are various different BS markings covering flammability and cleanliness/toxicity – all very confusing! When posting items, please confirm which stuffing you have used.

Many stuffings online have the fire safety numbers but not the hygiene ones. Please don't use these even if they say they are safe for toys.

The following are at present, (@ December 2024), available online and are approved for our items. You may use others which you find with the correct markings, but these must first be sanctioned by us. We'll need the full maker's name and the link where you buy it.

If you ring the company that makes it, which is Brimlake Textiles, on 020-8806-4599 and ask for a 10k (280 Litre) bag of Hollowfill it will cost you £25.00 plus £6.50 p&p.
